## God is With Us!

The first thing I would like you to do is read the following passage:

### [Haggai 2:1-9](#)

If you are reading the digital version, click on the passage above to read the text on BibleGateway.

If you are reading a printed version, Haggai might be tougher to find than say Matthew or Luke. It is the third to last book in the Old Testament.

I know that after reading that passage the first thing that came to mind, especially for liturgists in our traditional worship service, is “Whew! I sure am glad I didn’t have to read that out loud in front of everyone. Try saying:

Haggai  
Zerubbabel  
Shealtiel  
Jehozadak

Admittedly even I have to confess that these unfamiliar Hebrew names are intimidating to pronounce.

However, as I read the passage, the following words struck my heart:

*“Take courage, all you people of the land, says the Lord; work, for I am with you, says the Lord of hosts, according to the promise that I made you.”*

In times like these, it is easy to feel like the people of Israel who had seen their country and Temple go from riches to ruins. Although we are far from ruins, it sometimes feels like we get caught looking back at, as Haggai puts it, to our former glory.

But I know that if we trust the Lord, and faithfully follow where and when he leads, he

“will fill this house with splendor, says the Lord of hosts.” I am grateful for these encouraging words:

*My spirit abides among you; do not fear.*



## Reading, Reason, and Hope for Africa



On Sunday, November 17, BCUMC and myself will host a tea and silent auction for 44 children and 2-4 adult students in Kenya and Uganda. The event is planned to ensure that children, particularly in 2 places in Uganda, have tuition to go to school. Real horrors await children who have to drop out of school early, including childhood marriages, arranged marriages, illiteracy and thus extreme poverty, illnesses, lack of medical care and contraceptives, Malaria, sex trafficking, slavery, AIDS, and in parts of Uganda, human sacrifice (of children). Every year of primary school makes it less likely that any of these tragic events will occur. Secondary school ensures a better standard of life in these destitute countries. Trade school, two-year

college or 4-year university programs ensure a more successful life.



I have worked with two individuals in Uganda who care for orphans and destitute children. Henry Mayamba is the director of the Inter-religious Health Outreach Foundation Uganda, in Kampala. It houses at present 28 children and 5 volunteer staff, and cares for people in hospitals and their families. Henry says that the main enemy of the children is not AIDS but sex trafficking (sexual slavery), and he ensures that the children

go to school, even when there is nothing left in the meager bank account. He ensures an upbringing centered in Christ. He is an intensely spiritual man, and wise beyond his years. He speaks four languages, has two college degrees, yet lives simply. He was eager to "meet" Wayner on Facebook, and they have corresponded. Henry has malaria and every few months is just "not there." Emails and Facebook queries go unanswered. Silence from Henry means it is time to pray for his recovery, which he deeply appreciates. Henry's Facebook address is Healthfoundation Uganda, or Directorhenry Needyepeople.



Ssentamu Simon is a pineapple grower who teaches Bible classes in Nkoma, Masaka District, Uganda. He has 16 kids in the class, few of whom are sponsored. More kids want to join. Ssentamu does a lot more than teach the Bible; he ensures the safety, school attendance, and wellbeing of each child. I have had to send him some

workbooks on how to help grieving children, which he has used skillfully. He really is a natural social worker. Sent's new Facebook page is Nkomakids Masaka.

In Kenya and Uganda are now-finished projects & events which somewhat reflect the chaos associated with African aid: a library at Henry's Foundation, a small library for kids in Nkoma, a day care, a girls latrine at Henry's when the old one collapsed, purchases of fertilizer, mortar, coffee plants, a casket, medicine, hospital and doctor's fees, bus fare, Bibles for kids and adults, pencils, crayons and coloring books, a map of the world, a trophy for a soccer coach, salaries for 3 soccer referees, a musician's fee, and the list will go on. These have all been my doing and pleasure. Any funds raised will NOT go to anything other than tuition UNLESS you want to help bring electricity into the Pamela Media Resource Library at Henry's in Kampala. To bring electricity over from the road to the library building, put in overhead lights and fixtures, wall outlets, etc. through inspection would cost \$650. There are only a

few electricians in Kampala and they are expensive. But at least the children could study and read at night, which they are unable to do now.

Any contributions now or at the Nov. 17 tea and auction will be payable to the church and designated "African mission." Donations will be tax deductible. I will give a presentation at the event, and Wayner has planned a slide show and music from Uganda. There will be some information of the few but impressive adults in university in Kenya. There

will be plenty of time for the silent auction, a door prize or two, and cake, cookies, finger food, pie, coffee and tea at the event. The event is scheduled from 2-3:30 p.m.
